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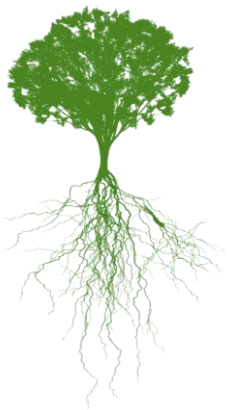

History of National FFA Week

Why should we celebrate National FFA Week?

Each year, FFA chapters around the country celebrate National FFA Week. It's a time to share the story of what FFA is and how FFA is preparing future leaders through agricultural education. Currently, FFA has more than 1,042,245 student members as part of 9,407 local FFA chapters in all 50 states, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands. Additionally, the organization is supported by 760,152 alumni members in 2,033 chapters. What better way to show your support of FFA than to get involved in FFA Week? Whether it's in person, on the phone or via social media, be sure to share your FFA stories. #FFAWeek



What are the roots of National FFA Week?

Designated as a national week in 1947, National FFA Week runs from Saturday to Saturday. The week of George Washington's birthday was selected to celebrate the impact he had on agriculture. FFA Week gives FFA members an opportunity to educate the public about agriculture and show their local impact and story. During the week, chapters conduct a variety of activities to help others in their school and community learn about FFA and agricultural education.

How can celebrating National FFA Week support my chapter, school and community?

By celebrating National FFA Week, the local chapter can engage all FFA members, students in the local school corporation, administration, faculty and staff, businesses in the community, alumni and supporters to bring awareness of the positive impact FFA and agricultural education have on members and students. Sharing each chapter's story only helps to communicate the positive impact members will have as world-changing future leaders.





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School and Community Roles

Explore the role of each group of people in your school and community during National FFA Week.

FFA Advisor

The FFA advisor is the first point of contact for National FFA Week and should provide approval for all events. The FFA advisor can also assist in coordinating and planning events.



Community Members

National FFA Week provides a great time to welcome community members to events and involve them with the chapter by asking them to help with and provide materials for events. FFA Week is also the perfect opportunity to thank them and recognize them for their support.

Chapter FFA Officers

FFA chapter officers should work alongside the advisor and FFA Alumni and Supporters to plan and execute the events for the week. This is a great time for chapter officers to help strengthen their team, improve member engagement and increase recruitment of new and younger members.



Feeder Schools

If there is a feeder school nearby (elementary or middle school whose students will feed into your school one day), National FFA Week is a great way to partner with them and introduce agricultural education and FFA to those students. Use fun activities so older students can engage with the younger ones.

School Leadership

School administration should approve all planned activities (per school rules). This is a great time to present to the school board about FFA as well as thank school leadership personnel for their support.



General Student Body

This is a great week to share FFA with the general student body to allow them to learn about agriculture and the opportunities available. This also provides an opportunity to possibly recruit new members or students into the agriculture classroom. Take the time to engage students outside of FFA to create a tighter-knit student body.

Chapter FFA Members

National FFA Week is a time to celebrate FFA and the chapter at your school. Take the time to engage members and have fun through a variety of activities. Prior to the week, form committees to plan ideas and involve different members to help every member gain even more leadership skills.



Advisory Committee

The advisory committee is a great way to gain support and feedback on the events being planned. This is also a great time to thank your advisory committee members for their support and help.

FFA Alumni and Supporters

FFA Alumni and Supporters can assist in helping to plan, coordinate and execute events throughout the week. These individuals can also provide support in the form of funds, grant access and supplies for functions. National FFA Week is also a great time to thank FFA Alumni and Supporters through recognition events.

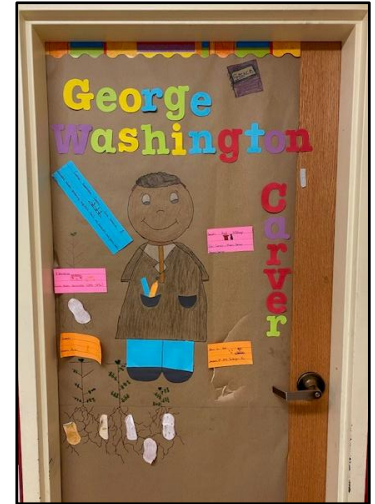

Engagement Ideas ★

Below is a collection of ideas to assist you in engaging each group of individuals in celebrating National FFA Week.

All Students

- Agriculture Trivia: Use the attached [trivia questions](#) for morning announcements or in your class.
- Scavenger Hunts: Attached are three types of [scavenger hunts](#), one for around the classroom, one for around the school and one for around the community.
- Encourage FFA members to invite a nonmember to the next FFA chapter meeting.
- Agriculture/FFA Facts Bulletin Board: Decorate a bulletin board in the hallway of the school to showcase FFA or agriculture facts.
- Penny Wars: Create a competition between classes to see who can raise the most pennies during FFA Week (the winning class could get a prize); donate the money that was raised to a local cause.
- Classroom Door Decorating: Create a competition between classes that requires classes to decorate their classroom doors in an agricultural theme; the winning class could get a prize.
- Drive a Tractor or Truck to School: Invite students to safely drive their tractors or trucks to school; work with your administration to organize a parade.
- Hat Day: Sell tickets for a dollar that will allow students to wear a hat on a specific day; donate the money that was raised to a local cause.
- Movie Night: Host a movie night with a family-friendly agriculture-themed movie to bring students and families together (movie options include *Temple Grandin*, *Charlotte's Webb* and *Ferdinand*).
- FFA Pie in the Face: Ask several teachers or use your officers as candidates to be pied in the face. Allow them to decorate a shoebox to collect money in. The person with the most money will be pied, and you can donate the money you raised to a local cause.
- Host an "Ag Olympics" by organizing agriculture-themed games like wheelbarrow races, hay-bale tossing, stick-horse racing, milking a fake cow using calf bottles, roping a fake steer, etc.
- Host a breakfast or lunch featuring local produce, dairy or meats, showcasing the importance of supporting local agriculture.



FFA Members

- Members Only Lunch: Host a pizza lunch or cookout in the agriculture room during the lunch period(s) for FFA members only.
- Chapter Box Exchange: Work with another agriculture teacher in a different region or state to do a box exchange to learn more about each other's programs.
- Chapter Kickball Game: Create kickball teams within your chapter or invite nearby chapters to play a kickball game during FFA Week.
- FFA Member Yard/Locker Signs: Create FFA member signs or magnets that students can post in their front yards or on their lockers to show pride in being a member.
- Signing Day: Host a signing day during a school assembly where students can "sign" their commitment to their career field, college, trade school or FFA membership.
- FFA Wristbands: Give wristbands to your FFA members at the beginning of the week. Each day they visit the agriculture classroom and show their wristbands, give them a treat for members only.
- Chapter Meeting: Host your regular chapter meeting during FFA Week so your members can celebrate FFA together.
- Invite a State Officer: If your state officer team can be requested for chapter visits, request a visit during FFA Week.
- FFA Member Bingo: Use this [bingo card](#) to encourage your FFA members to get to know one another better by collecting signatures.
- FFA Talent Show: Organize a talent show where students can showcase their agricultural skills, such as roping, storytelling or showing off their projects.



Dress-Up Days

School Staff

- Thank You Notes: Have your agriculture students and/or FFA members make and write thank you notes for teachers, administrators, janitors, cafeteria workers, bus drivers and other staff members.
- Staff Snack Cart: Use a cart to deliver fun snacks and drinks to staff members around the school. Get your FFA members in official dress to deliver the snacks and drinks.
- Meals for Staff: Host a potluck or catered meal for your staff members (pancake breakfast, catered lunch, after-school dessert).
- Plants for Staff: Gift extra plants from the greenhouse to your staff members. (Succulents make easy gifts!)
- FFA Alumni Staff Display: Ask staff members at your school if they were in FFA and if they still have their jackets; put the staff FFA jackets on display in the hallway.
- School Board Presentation: Request a presentation spot for the school board meeting that happens in the month of February to educate board members about FFA week.
- Staff CDE Stations: Work with your administration to allow your officers/members to host CDE stations at a staff meeting. This will allow staff members to understand the contests your FFA members compete in.



Alumni and Supporters

- Chapter Meeting Invitation: Invite your alumni and supporters to attend your FFA chapter meeting or another FFA Week event; organize an alumni versus FFA member game like kickball, softball or basketball.
- Forever Blue Network (FBN): Reach out to your alumni and supporters and encourage them to join the FBN.
- FFA Call-a-Thon: Organize a call-a-thon where your FFA members can call your alumni and supporters and tell them thank you for being involved in alumni or for donating to and supporting the chapter.
- Sponsor Visits: With FFA members in official dress, visit local businesses that have sponsored your chapter; present them with a certificate or a gift as a thank you for supporting the chapter (yard signs are a hit!).
- Sponsorship Drive: If you still need to collect sponsorships for an FFA event (such as a banquet), use the time during FFA Week to visit local businesses and ask for sponsors ([use this resource](#)).
- FFA Open Mic: Partner with a local restaurant or coffee shop to host an open mic night where FFA members can showcase their talents.
- FFA Proclamation: Work with your town mayor or town manager to create a proclamation that will be presented at the February town hall meeting to recognize FFA Week. ([Use this guide to help](#) or [this template](#).)



Service

- Build a Little Free Pantry for your community ([see plans here](#)).
- Start a Little Free Library for your community. Consider stocking it with books about agriculture.
- Complete a roadside or waterway clean-up project.
- Read children's books about agriculture to local daycares or host a reading time at your local library.
- Clean up your local fairgrounds or park or a nearby waterway.
- Start a school beautification project such as planting flowers, painting murals or creating outdoor learning spaces.
- Volunteer at your local soup kitchen, mission or food pantry.
- Walk dogs or play with cats at a local animal shelter.
- Host a canned food drive, toiletries drive or toy drive at your school.
- Create goody bags for the local nursing home.
- Check out some of the ideas in the "All Students" section above that highlight raising money to donate!
- Partner with your feeder schools (elementary or middle) and send FFA members to the schools to read agricultural children's books or teach an agriculture lesson.
- Start a mentorship program with younger students. Teach them about agriculture, leadership and community service.
- Host an agriculture field day and invite the community or the feeder schools to attend.



Fundraisers

- Sell dinner plate tickets (spaghetti dinners, chicken plates, barbeque plates, etc.).
- Host a family bingo night — sell bingo cards, get donated prizes, incorporate a dinner or desserts.
- Organize a chili cook-off or pig-cooking contest.
- Set up a table at Tractor Supply (or another local hardware/farm store) to sell FFA T-shirts, baked goods, etc.
- Work with your local fairgrounds to put on a livestock show.
- Plant sale. Consider selling flowers, vegetables, herbs or succulents.
- Check out some of the ideas in the "All Students" section above that highlight ideas for raising money.

Example of a National FFA Week Plan

Below is an example of a National FFA Week that a chapter may have planned. A template follows to help you plan your own week.

<i>Day of the Week</i>	<i>Events</i>
<i>Saturday</i>	- Host a chili cook-off and bags/cornhole tournament. - Deliver yard signs to FFA member homes or place magnets on lockers. - Make the chapter profile picture blue. #FFAWeek @NationalFFA
<i>Sunday</i>	- Have an FFA officer/FFA Week committee meeting to finalize details for the week. - FFA pizza party at a local restaurant or meeting place - Write thank you notes to alumni and supporters to be delivered during the week.
<i>Monday</i>	- Dress-up Day: All-American Day - Morning announcement over the intercom, through social media or via a podcast episode - Lunchtime trivia/trivia question of the day (first to respond wins) - Volunteer in your community by cleaning up the side of the road by your school. - Present at the school board meeting.
<i>Tuesday</i>	- Dress-up Day: Career Day — dress up for a future career - Morning announcement over the intercom, through social media or via a podcast episode - Alumni and Supporters Breakfast - Have alumni or supporters serve as guest speakers and talk about their careers. - Dodgeball tournament after school - Write thank you notes and send them to alumni and supporters. - Have a scavenger hunt based on career pathways (students will take pictures of themselves with a business or item from each career pathway).
<i>Wednesday</i>	- Dress-up Day: Dress Like Your Favorite Teacher Day - Morning announcement over the intercom, through social media or via a podcast episode - Deliver slices of pie to all school staff to support staff and administration. - Have a pie-eating contest during each lunch period. - After school, travel to the local humane society to walk dogs, play with cats and clean the facilities.
<i>Thursday</i>	- Dress-up Day: College Day — wear your favorite collegiate apparel - Morning announcement over the intercom, through social media or via a podcast episode - Have a collegiate FFA alumni member serve as a guest speaker. - Movie watch party - Encourage friends and family to give to FFA today! #GIVEFFADAY #FFAWeek - Use the toolkit at FFA.org/GiveFFADay.
<i>Friday</i>	- Dress-up Day: Wear Blue! - Morning announcement over the intercom, through social media or via a podcast episode - Determine how many corn kernels are in the jar. - Travel to the elementary school during class to read to elementary school students or read virtually. - Basketball game canned-goods drive
<i>Saturday</i>	- Volunteer at a soup kitchen, mission or food pantry. - Travel to a local nursing home and wave or sing to local residents.

- Place orders for any giveaways you may be planning to hand out (Ex. shirts, FFA pins, etc.).
- Determine any individuals that will be recognized during the week and print certificates (Ex. administrators, etc.).

- Have the National FFA Week committee meet to begin mapping out activities and events for each day (this may take multiple meetings).

November

- Gain administrator approval of events, dress-up days, service activities, etc.
- Begin reserving any spaces needed (Ex. gym) for events.
- Start getting donations if funds, items, etc. are needed. Need help asking businesses for support? Use the [Proposal Letter Template](#).
- Design and vote on a chapter T-shirt for the week. Use the [FFA T-shirt Design Brainstorm](#) worksheet to sketch out ideas.

January

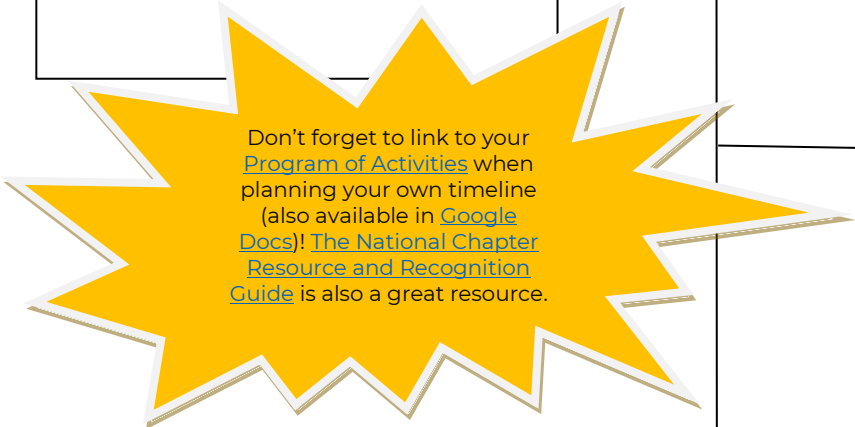
- Send letters and invitations to community members for any events they are invited to.
- Make posters for school advertisement (make sure to get administrator approval).
- Place any last-minute orders (Ex. cookies, pies, breakfast materials).

Sponsorship Toolkit

Planning for a Potential Partner Meeting or Call

Pre-Planning

- What are your goals for the visit or call?
 - It is important that you have a clear idea of what the expected outcomes of the call or visit are so the agenda can be developed appropriately.
 - If the agenda is too vague, the meeting will not focus on the issues that need to be addressed.
- How much do you know about the company? How much do you know about the person you will be calling or meeting?
 - Take the time to conduct some simple research about the company:
 - What kinds of projects does the company produce or support?
 - What connections can you make with the company's mission and goals?
 - Make as many connections between your organization and the company as possible.
- Is the person with whom you will be meeting a decision maker, or will this person need to take your information and requests to a superior?

During the Meeting or Call

- Come prepared with opportunities for engagement.
- Have ideas of possible opportunities for involvement by the potential partner.
 - Sponsorship
 - Judges
 - Mentors
 - Events
 - Fundraisers
- Even if the meeting or call only lets you know what the company is NOT interested in, the meeting will at least give you information that can be used in a follow-up call.
- Your preparation for the meeting demonstrates how interested you really are in the company.

What to Leave Behind and Next Steps

- Make sure to leave behind a piece of information that the potential partner can use to evaluate possibilities with your organization (i.e., FFA one-page facts sheet, impact report, visibility plan) and easily share with others.
- A pin or some sort of giveaway with the school's or FFA chapter's name on it is also a nice touch.
- Make sure that the next steps and roles are defined before the meeting or call ends.
- Prompt and proper follow-up should be conducted after a promising meeting so that your effort is not lost.

Ask Questions and LISTEN

- Don't be the only one doing the talking. Allow the potential partner to share information about the business and offer ideas on how a partnership/relationship might be mutually beneficial.
- Keep your presentation brief and elaborate as questions are asked.

Potential Partner Questions

- What has your exposure to our organization been?
- What interests you most about our organization?
- What other types of organizations does your company partner with?
- What does a successful partnership look like to your company? Does it include employee engagement, brand awareness and equity, student recruiting, connecting other companies to our mission, special perks or something else?
- What are the most critical results you would expect to see from this partnership?

Tips for Asking Local Businesses for Donations

- Include personal stories and the impact that donations can make.
- Keep a spreadsheet of donors with contact information, donation description, and any benefits or visibility they received.
- Businesses may be more likely to give if they are offered visibility.
 - Signs or banners in the agricultural education classroom or meeting/event locations
 - Could be specific (Snack Cart provided by)
 - Verbal recognition at events
 - Set amount of time to speak at an event
 - Sponsorship mentioned in the local newspaper
 - Social media shout outs
 - Business logo on any printed materials for events (Special thanks to our sponsors with their logo)
 - Programs
 - Table tents
 - Signage
 - Allow them to provide giveaway items (pens, hats, reusable bags) or coupons.
- Individuals and businesses may be more likely to continue sponsorship if they get special perks.
 - VIP seating and/or early admission
 - Meet and greets
 - T-shirt or gift
- Visibility plans could encourage higher levels of donations (see the [Sample Sponsorship Levels](#) below).
 - Get creative: use themed names for the sponsorship levels.
 - If you have any analytics about your program or event, share those. For example, 200 students and their families will see the business logo, or the chapter Facebook page has 200 followers.
- Thank sponsors after events or at the end of the school year.
 - Handwritten notes from students
 - Email
 - Social media
 - Include statistics
 - Include a picture
 - Plaque for their business
 - Banquet recognition
- Be consistent. Individuals and businesses may notice if others get extra benefits.
- In-kind donations are a great option for businesses that can't donate money.
 - Food and beverages
 - Flowers and plants
 - Decorations
 - Printing and signage
 - T-shirts
- Businesses that can't give cash or checks may be able to donate gift cards.
 - Gift cards can be used for giveaways, silent or live auctions and raffles.

Scavenger Hunt ★

A scavenger hunt can be a great way to get students excited and involved both in and out of the classroom. Below you will find three different types of scavenger hunts with which to engage students.

Scavenger Hunt in the Classroom

Prep:

1. Select the trivia questions you would like to use. (Tip: Use the [FFA Facts](#) or [Agriculture Trivia](#) to save time!)
2. Print and cut out each question separately.
3. Number each trivia question.
4. Create an answer key.
5. Hide each question around the classroom or agriculture facility.

Student Instructions:

1. Students will need their own notebook paper numbered to match the questions. (The numbers will depend on how many questions you hid around the room.)
2. Students will move about the room to find each question. Once a question is found, they will write down the answer on their paper next to the correct number. (If the question says No. 6, they write the answer next to No. 6 on their paper.)
3. Once students find and answer all the hidden questions, they turn the paper into the teacher or other designated person.
4. Number each paper in the order they come in. (Tip: It is best to stay in one spot while students are moving around the room.)
5. Wait until each student has turned in a paper.

Who Wins?

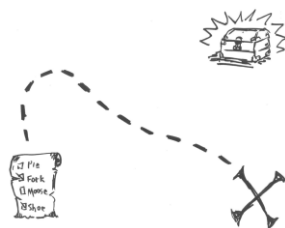
1. Grade students with the answer key as papers come in.
2. The students who turn in the papers with the most correct answers first wins.
 - a. Example: If Susie turns in her paper first and misses three, but Juan turns in his paper second and misses zero, Juan wins.
3. Recognize the winner! (Award Ideas: extra credit, candy, etc.)

Scavenger Hunt Around the School

1. Develop clues that can be linked throughout the school. For example, the corduroy resides here, which would lead students to the FFA jacket closet. Each stop needs to then have a clue to go to the next place.
2. Hide the clues in their respective places.
3. Have a surprise at the final destination.

OR

1. Create a list of items they have to complete and explain how they have to show completion. Examples:
 - a. Find one friend that is on the livestock judging team. Take a picture with them.
 - b. Find an administrator and take a picture of you thanking them for their support of the chapter.
 - c. This is where we "grow" learning, take a picture. (Answer: greenhouse).
 - d. Score big when you take your shot at success. (Answer: basketball court)
2. Hide clues in their respective places.
3. Have a surprise at the final destination.



"Ag in the Community" Photo Scavenger Hunt

1. Provide students with each of the different focus areas (Agribusiness Systems, Animal Systems, Biotechnology Systems, Environmental Service Systems, Food Products and Processing Systems, Natural Resources Systems, Plant Systems, and Power, Structural and Technical Systems) or the steps of the [AFNR Value Chain](#).
2. Have students travel throughout the community and take pictures of themselves at a location that represents/fits into each category.
3. Have students send their pictures to a discussion post or share them online through sources such as [GooseChase](#).
4. Recognition of the winner:
 - a. Consider having categories to award multiple students. Examples:
 - (1) Most creative picture
 - (2) Most unique site visit
 - (3) Best collage
 - b. Consider using the following to recognize winners:
 - (1) Send out an email.
 - (2) Post a winner video.
 - (3) Host a live winner stream.
 - (4) Place an announcement about the winner on the chapter's social media.

National FFA Week Box Exchange ★



Would you love for your FFA members to get a chance to see what other FFA chapters do and to meet other FFA members? This activity provides an opportunity for teachers and chapters to connect.

National FFA Week Box Exchange can be used with officer teams (virtually or in person) or a particular class.

1. Using the [FFA chapter locator](#) on FFA.org, locate a chapter in an opposite part of the country that would be interested in doing a box exchange. Discuss how many items/what types of items you would like to exchange.

2. Determine items to be included in your box. Use the following list to help:

- Snack Attack Sunday
 - Send favorite bus snacks, CDE cravings, etc.
- Memory Monday
 - Have chapter officers create a five-minute video highlighting their agriculture facility/FFA chapter or what FFA means to them.
- T-shirt Tuesday
 - Do you have a box of old FFA shirts? Send some of your old FFA gear in random sizes and quantities.
- Working Wednesday
 - Send three to five examples of agriculture from your part of the world.
 - Maybe consider sending products from SAEs
- Thankful Thursday
 - Send notes of encouragement to each of the officers.

 - Ask advisors to create a time to have the officer team or chapter members meet up on Zoom or another video conferencing service.
 - Potential Questions
 - What is your favorite community service activity?
 - How do you recruit FFA members?
 - What is your best FFA trip?
 - How do you fundraise?

Strengthen Agriculture by Telling the FFA Story! ★

How can I tell the story of FFA and my chapter? Here are some ideas to help with promotion throughout the community.

Write an editorial for your local newspapers. Highlight the many opportunities FFA has to offer.

Have a local mayor and/or town official sign the [National FFA Week Proclamation](#). Take it a step further and reach out to the governor to sign the proclamation.

Work with local billboard agencies and secure space for an FFA Week billboard. Ask them if they will donate the space for a month or so. (Some towns have old movie theatre sign space to rent too!)

Create and place "FFA Supporter" signs in the windows of partnering businesses. (Yard signs are a great option also!)

Interview an FFA Alumni or Supporter member. Put together a video of several interviews to show what FFA has meant to alumni or why they support FFA.

Send a [congressional letter](#) to announce National FFA Week.

Provide [FFA facts](#) for your local media and school newspaper.

Work with local newspapers and radio and TV stations to highlight the activities of the chapter and FFA members. Don't forget about your school newspaper and [announcements](#).

Planning for Advocacy

Advocating is an important and essential role needed in agriculture. And what better week to advocate for agriculture, agricultural education and FFA than FFA Week! The [Agricultural Literacy and Advocacy Model](#) consists of four steps: plan, develop, do and reflect. This model can be used to complete advocacy experiences with different audiences, including those encountered during FFA week: [elected officials](#), [peers](#), [community members](#) and [elementary students](#).



As your chapter plans activities, encourage students to plan an advocacy activity. With each potential audience, think about the following steps.

1. **Plan** — Establish the overall question you want to investigate in this step. Each guiding question below will help determine the main question.

- a. **Define your issue:**

What is the challenge we are facing?

Example: Idea that brown cows give chocolate milk

- b. **Analyze:**

What is the vital information we need to know, and where can we find it?

Example: What age group has the greatest misunderstanding?

- c. **Understand the audience:**

Who are we trying to influence?

Example: Elementary children aged K-3rd grade

2. **Develop** — Now that you have analyzed the situation and identified the target audience, it's time to develop materials, messages and resources. The following questions help guide you.

- a. **Write objectives:**

What do we want to accomplish?

Example: Educate students about agriculture.

- b. **Identify SMART goals:**

How are we going to accomplish this goal?

Example: We will increase knowledge about agriculture for 20 elementary school students. We will do this by hosting an ag day. This will be accomplished in one month.

- c. **Determine key messages:**

What are our important talking points for our defined audience?

Example: Agriculture is present in all areas of our lives.



d. **Develop a plan:**

What are the steps we need to take to achieve our objectives?

Example: Identify school, animals and a lesson.

3. **Do** — Once students have successfully planned and developed resources, it's time to act. What are the next steps? Collaborate, execute and raise awareness! Use the following guiding questions to assist in the activity completion.

a. **Collaborate:**

How can we partner with others to strengthen our advocacy efforts?

Example: Find area experts that can provide animals or lessons.



How are we using what we know?

b. **Execute:**

Example: What did we learn in our agriculture classes that we can share?

c. **Raise awareness:**

How do we promote our advocacy efforts and gain support?

Example: Reach out to the newspaper to highlight the activity.

4. **Reflect** — Once the activity is over, it's time to reflect on what happened and what can be changed and/or improved. Use these questions to reflect on what you just accomplished.

a. **Monitor:**

What information can we collect that will demonstrate impact?

Example: What are the students' perceptions before and after our activity?



How well did we achieve our objectives?

b. **Review:**

Example: Share how you met, exceeded or did not meet your expectations during this event.

What changes can we make to improve?

c. **Adapt:**

Example: Change lesson we provided to be more relatable for age.

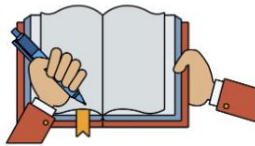

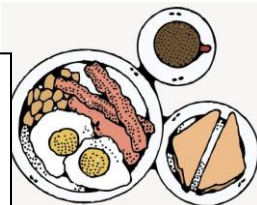

Or, host a virtual "brown bag" luncheon, invite family or personal support individuals and have students share how FFA has impacted them.



Student Recognition ★

National FFA Week provides a great opportunity to recognize students, both members and nonmembers. Through recognition, you can share the value and accomplishments that members have made, which can aid in recruitment and retention within the program.

Recognize SAE programs in each class and have that student share what they have learned.



Recognize members with outstanding record books by having them share their experiences in class, with alumni and supporters or at an in-person or virtual school board meeting.

Recognize student career goals and highlight agriculture career opportunities with career fairs, industry tours or presentations in class or to the school board.



Hold a mock competition or a portion of one to show off student skills related to topics covered in classroom instruction. (Ex. develop a new way to package a food item; students create a flower arrangement using the elements of design and display items in the school/community).



Recognize students by sharing their FFA stories in the school newsletter/blog, in class or in the local newspaper. Example prompt: How has FFA impacted your life?

Hold an agriscience or science fair within your classroom. Students solve a problem using the scientific method and create a display board to show the project process and findings.

Have students demonstrate skills learned through their SAEs, class projects, in-class jobs or chapter meeting presentations and events.

Recognize student leadership successes in class, whether it is gained through FFA or another organization.

Career, Trade School, College and/or Member Signing Day ★

Recognizing accomplishments and successes is a wonderful way to bring members closer and recognize hard work. As a way to do this, try an official Signing Day during National FFA Week! Signing days are typically used when students have made a decision or are becoming a part of something new that will advance them personally or in their careers. Use the following to celebrate students committing to colleges, careers, joining the FFA or Greenhand ceremonies, just to name a few examples!

- Have the student fill this out prior to the event:

- **Planning:**

- Start by discussing the event with students and explaining its importance.
- Gain access to a larger table with chairs and decorate with balloons or special backdrop (this is where the “signing” will take place).
- Find a large area (shop, large classroom, gymnasium) where the signing table can be set, along with space for attendees to gather and watch.
- Invite other students from the chapter, agricultural class or school assembly to attend and watch the event.
- Create a poster for each student that includes their picture, background, future plans, etc. so attendees at the signing event can view them while they are waiting for the event to start.
- Find someone to take pictures.
- Invite future employers or someone to recognize each student specifically (can be a guidance counselor, principal, coach, etc.).
- Gain permission and time for the presentation from administration.
- Consider something that can be handed to each student. Examples: a hat with the trade school logo, a company hat or shirt, etc. If this is a member signing day, consider giving students a piece of official dress or a pin if these are new Greenhand members.
- Print signing certificates for each student.
- Consider snacks and water/lemonade for a reception after the signing ceremony. Be sure to determine the location and decorations.
- Invite administration, advisory board, parents, etc.



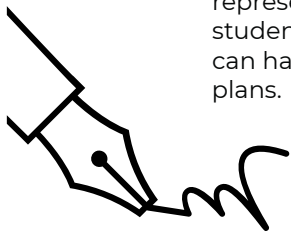
- **Set Up:**

- Set up or hang a plain backdrop or one with school logos.
- Cover the table with a tablecloth.
- Ensure that future employers or the person recognizing each student specifically has arrived (can be a guidance counselor, principal, coach, etc.).
- Ensure there is an item for each student to be handed.
- Ensure there is a certificate to sign for each student.
- Set up the reception area with snacks, tablecloths, decorations, etc.



- **Run of Show**

- Welcome:
 - *Welcome to the [insert school name/FFA Chapter] Career and Trade School Signing Day. We are excited to recognize and celebrate these students on their success in school and choosing their path. Please join me in congratulating each student as they officially sign.*
- Student Presentation
 - Call each student up one at a time and have the student sit behind the table. Have the student's representative come up as well. Announce students' names, where they are going and the quote the student shared in the form. Have the representative present students with their signing certificates. Or, you can have multiple students sign at once and then have them individually tell the crowd about their future plans.
 - While the student is signing, have the photographer take pictures. After signing, the student can stand with the representative and do an exchange of the item (ex. Hold the shirt up to the student, etc.). Be sure lots of pictures are taken of the exchange.
 - Announce: *Congratulations to [Student name] on his/her/their commitment to [career/trade school name, joining FFA]. We are excited to see you continue to excel!*
- Conclusion
 - *As we send these students onto their next big step in life, may we remember the important role they will play and the impact they will make.*
- After the Signing Ceremony
 - Invite guests and students to join you for a celebratory reception.

1. *Suggested Use:* If you have ample time to complete an FFA unit, then these activities could be stretched over two or more weeks. Some activities require more work than others. If your time is limited, you could put students into groups of four. Each group member would be responsible for completing one block from the “Remember/Understand” row and one block from the “Apply/Analyze/Evaluate” row. Group members would then teach the other group members what they learned. The group would work together to complete the items in the “Create” row.
2. *Grading:* How you determine if a student has completed the tasks depends on your preference and what resources are available to you. Suggestions include having them email or print something that proves they completed a task or for them to write a brief summary paragraph of a video they watched or article they read.
 - a. Work can be collected weekly or every few weeks for grading.

Lesson Plan:

1. **Bell Ringer:** Hand each student a sticky note when they enter the classroom. On the sticky note, each student should write one thing they love about FFA. Once all students are done have them place their sticky note in a designated spot that has been labeled "Legacy Wall." Once all students have added their sticky note, discuss responses as a class.
2. **Introduction:** *FFA can have a big impact on individuals, the community and agriculture. Today, we are going to explore this impact.*

4. **Follow-up:** Have students coordinate an event for National FFA Week celebrations.
5. **Exit Ticket:** Have students share their reflections.

National Days of Service Project Examples

Across the country, FFA chapters are making an impact in their communities through service events. Below are a few examples of service projects to inspire your FFA chapter to participate in the FFA Week National Days of Service event.

To be eligible to receive funding through the FFA Day of Service Mini-Grant, service events must meet an actual/authentic community need. For example, hosting a thank-you breakfast for community members or farmers during FFA Week would not be funded under the grant guidelines. Serving a breakfast at the local soup kitchen would be funded as they can demonstrate a strong need.

Below are samples of National Days of Service events held during October. For more inspiration, visit FFA.org/LivingToServe to view interactive service maps.



Prairie View FFA, KS

Prairie View FFA members looked at community safety from a couple lenses — environmental and public safety. During the month of October, the FFA chapter hosted a community clean up to remove trash around the community as well as hosted a safe-driving day at their school and distributed Drive Safe Emergency Vehicle kits.



Clay FFA, FL

The Clay FFA Chapter addressed hunger access issues by partnering with local farmers and the various community gardens to glean produce. Community members also assisted in these efforts, and all donations were given to the local food bank.



El Centro FFA, CA

Members of El Centro FFA found that during the pandemic local animal shelters were becoming overpopulated and were in dire need of resources for the various animals. The chapter set up collection sites around the community to collect much-needed resources and then delivered them to the local shelter.



Parkside FFA, MD

FFA members from the Parkside FFA spent one busy day focusing on all things environmental. Members provided several opportunities for community members to learn and serve. Members held a demonstration at their school garden on cover crops, worked on a local rooftop garden, cleaned up the pocket meadow project and worked on restoring a floating wetland.
