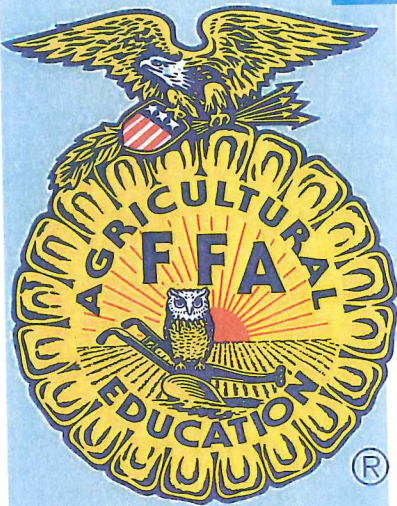


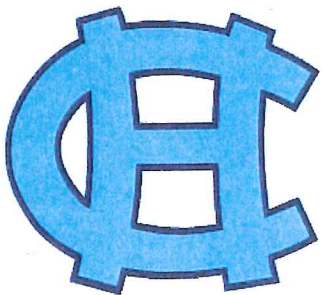
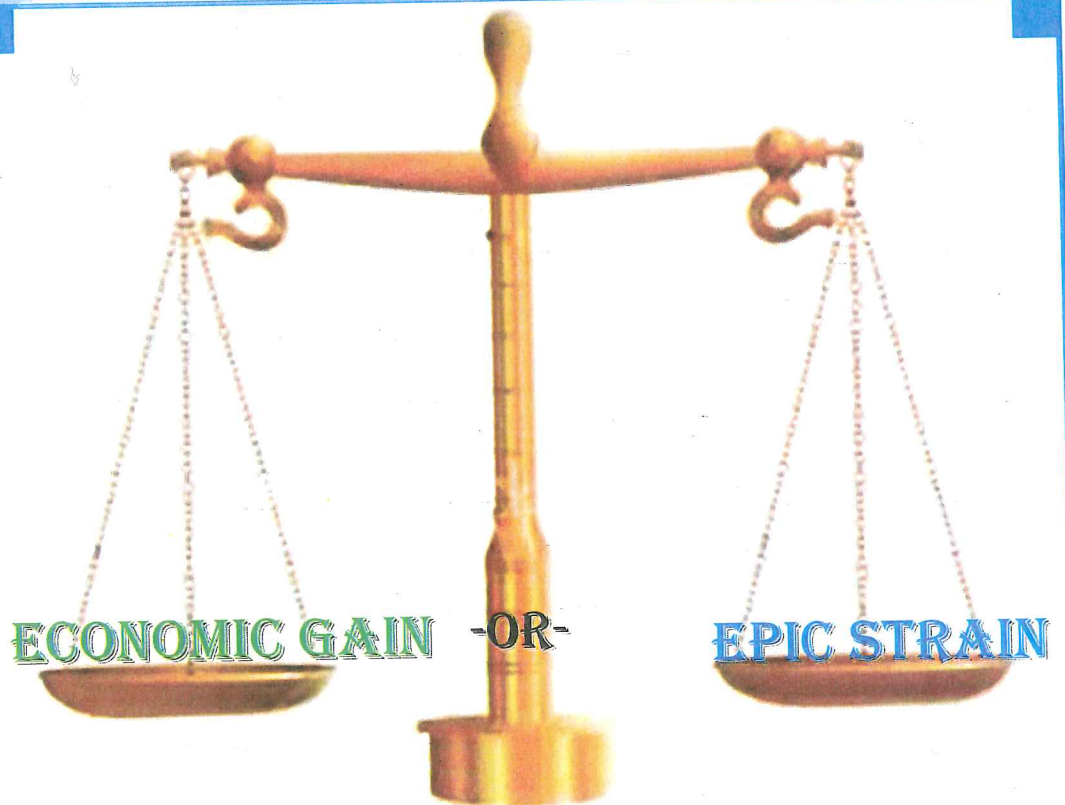

BLUEGRASS PIPELINE INFORMATION

Courses in which instruction occurred? Plant and Land Science (26 students), Agriculture Communications (33 students), and Environmental Science (72 students)

Why is this issue important now? The issue regarding the Bluegrass Pipeline is important now because plans for installation and operation have already begun. Many county meetings have been held to further educate citizens about this project across the state of Kentucky. Williams and Boardwalk, the company responsible for the installation of this infrastructure, have met both avid supporters and passionate opponents along the way. The pipeline offers numerous economical benefits, such as job growth and tax revenues, but the project also carries significant risks that the public is genuinely concerned about, such as environmental and safety hazards. Although the project is currently on hold as the company expands its customer base, the debate is far from being over. The company has already invested over \$28 million in Kentucky easements and has given more than \$136,000 in community grants in Hardin County. With investments this substantial, the project is sure to be resumed when the customer base is satisfactory. If implemented, the innovation and technology will forever impact future generations.

What is the nature of the issue? The nature of the Bluegrass Pipeline issue is complex. While the transportation of natural gas liquids from the Marcellus and Utica Shale to the southeastern United States would offer several benefits, the project would also be accompanied by numerous disadvantages. The transportation of these products could help boost the economies of the counties and states traversed by the pipeline, but at the same time it could cause harmful and potentially irreparable damage should complications ever occur. There are currently over 2.5 million miles of pipeline already present throughout the United States and over 12,500 miles of pipeline in the state of Kentucky. However, according to the Pipeline and Hazardous Materials Safety Administration (PHMSA), there are fewer than 28,000 miles of NGL pipelines in the US, accounting for just 1.6% of total pipeline mileage.

Who is involved in the issue? Many people have been involved in the development of the Bluegrass Pipeline. At the forefront of this project are two companies, Williams Company and Boardwalk Pipeline Partners, or Williams and Boardwalk. Texas Gas Transmission is the company that will manage transportation of the natural liquids to Louisiana where they will be refined. Landowners play a large role because they will supply the ground in which the pipeline will be laid. Local officials are weighing all aspects of the pipeline as court cases and legislative bills arise to govern this project regarding aspects such as eminent domain. The US Army Corps of Engineers' approval of a wetlands-destruction permit is required prior to pipeline installation. All local residents where the pipeline will be present have the potential of being impacted should a leak or explosion ever occur.

How can the issue be defined? The Bluegrass Pipeline is a combination of an environmental and an agriculture policy issue. Many farmers, environmentalists, and local citizens have raised pertinent questions regarding the environmental impact this pipeline would create. Factors such as contaminating water supply, minimizing the use of farmland, endangering the safety to communities, and jeopardizing climate health for future generations are some of the chief concerns being addressed by pipeline opponents. The issue of agriculture policy arises because of the potential use of eminent domain by the company to seize property. Court cases have been held to determine whether Williams and Boardwalk has the authority to exercise the use of eminent domain. Bluegrass Pipeline officials claim they have the right to condemn property for the use of the pipeline, but Franklin County Circuit Judge Phillip Shepherd ruled that the power of eminent domain cannot be delegated to a private company unless the legislature finds that it would be in the public interest. Although this initial ruling prohibits the use of eminent domain and protects the landowners, the decision is currently being appealed by the Bluegrass Pipeline entity.²

BLUEGRASS PIPELINE INFORMATION

What is the historical background of the issue? Boardwalk Pipeline Partners have been in business since 2005 and currently manage approximately 14,450 miles of pipeline. Williams Company has been in business since 1908 and employs approximately 4,700 people. These two companies have joined to create Williams and Boardwalk which will install the Bluegrass Pipeline, an infrastructure to transport natural gas liquids from the Marcellus and Utica Shale to Eunice, Louisiana. The Marcellus and Utica Shale has existed in the northeastern part of the country for many years but was only recently discovered. The company began securing land easements last year and has secured nine of the thirteen counties they plan to cross in Kentucky; however, the project is currently on hold as the company expands its customer base. Because the Marcellus and Utica Shale has the potential of securing 1 million barrels per day of natural gas, some are estimating that the US could be the primary exporter of energy products by 2020.

What caused the issue? NGL “production” has increased significantly over the past few years, going hand-in-hand with the process of hydraulic fracturing for natural gas. The most common NGL products are ethane, propane, butane, and octane. These components are fractionated and used as raw materials by the petrochemical industry. These NGLs require a pathway where they can be taken and separated into their constituents so that they can be used in various ways, and that place for this project is ultimately in Louisiana. This issue was caused when the path for the pipeline was being planned and landowners were being approached for easements within properties. The underlying threat of eminent domain has caused many private landowners and local citizens to rally against the project, while easement packages offered to landowners have initiated several positive working relationships between local families and the Bluegrass Pipeline.

What are the risks? This pipeline could cause major inconveniences to community members and increased safety and health risks. Many Kentuckians are concerned that this pipeline will damage landscapes and natural history, put communities at risk, exacerbate climate change, and threaten local agriculture and outdoor tourism. Additional risks associated with the Bluegrass Pipeline include road damage and road congestion during pipeline construction, disruption of natural ecosystems, potential leaks and contamination of local water sources, localized air pollution, damage to over 750 waterways pipeline construction will cut through, clear-cut right of ways, and fires or explosions. Kentucky’s geographical layout also offers unique risk factors because of the numerous sinkholes throughout the state. Recent events such as the gas line explosion in Adair County and the sinkhole collapse in Bowling Green have fueled the fear of Kentuckians, especially those living near the proposed Bluegrass Pipeline route. According to the Kentucky Resource Council, 1.6 gas line leaks and ruptures occur daily in the US.

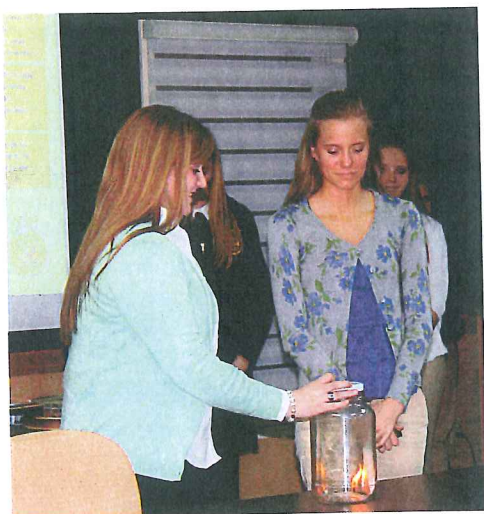
What are the benefits? As a result of the Bluegrass Pipeline, companies are making investments in their businesses and facilities, which translate into new jobs and economic growth for Kentuckians and the United States. Using this abundant, domestically-produced product for U.S. industries increases the number of energy products that are “Made in America” and also affords an export opportunity that could relieve some of the country’s trade deficit. During construction, restaurants, hotels, and retailers will experience increased activity from construction crews. The state and local community will benefit economically through state and local sales. Local communities will also benefit from the increased property taxes that Williams & Boardwalk will pay during the ongoing operation of the pipeline. Private landowners who choose to provide the company with a permanent easement will also receive personal compensation. Several community organizations, such as the Hardin County Board of Education and the Kentucky Government and Emergency Management associations, have also received funds given through community grants to counties traversed by the pipeline in an effort for the company to be neighborly in the communities where it will exist.

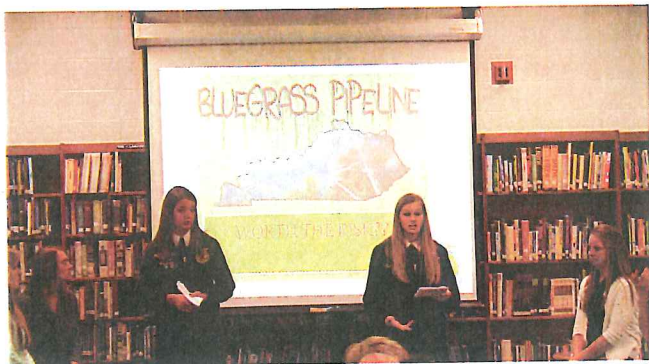

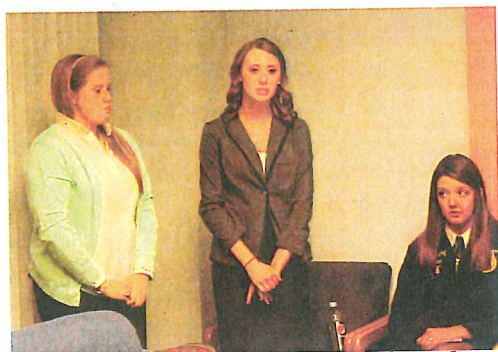

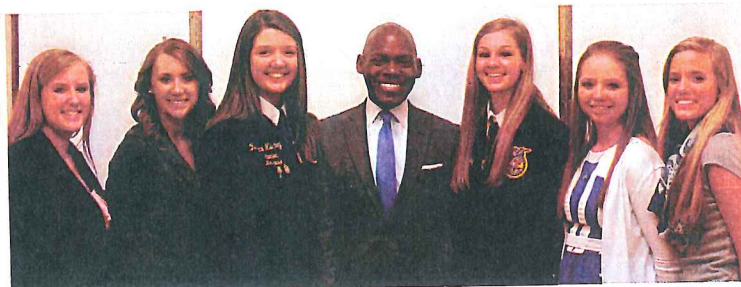
