Vice President	Name <u>two</u> subsidiary motions that are <u>both</u> debatable <u>and</u> amendable.	• Amend (debatable if applied to a debatable motion). • Commit or Refer. • Postpone to a Certain Time (or Definitely).

One example is that the motion to <i>Postpone Indefinitely</i> requires a second. What are the standard descriptive characteristics for the subsidiary motion to <i>Postpone Indefinitely</i> regarding: 1. the vote required to adopt it. 2. if it can be debated.	1.
