**Final Round
Motions & Oral Questions**

I move that our chapter take a field trip to the State Capitol when the Legislature is in session.

Required Motions:

Commit (Refer to Committee) Subsidiary

- Q) Special and Standing Committees play an important role in FFA chapters. There are five (5) methods of appointing members to committees, can you name the five methods? (p. 492-496)
- A) Election by Ballot
Nominations from the Floor
Nominations from the Chair
Appointment by the Chair
Appointment by Adoption of a Motion Naming Members of a Committee

Previous Question Subsidiary

- Q) There are two forms of the motion Previous Question. Can you name the two forms?
- A) Unqualified (Previous Question on the immediate pending motion)
Qualified (Previous Question on all pending business) (p. 199)
- Q) Can both forms of Previous Question be pending at the same time?
- A) Yes - “When a motion for the Previous Question is immediately pending in such a case, it can be made again with more or fewer pending questions included...before the first motion for the Previous Question is voted on.” (p. 200)

Suspend the Rules Incidental

- Q) What vote is required to suspend a standing rule?
- A) Majority vote. (p. 265-266)
- Q) What vote is required to suspend a parliamentary rule?
- A) Two-thirds ($\frac{2}{3}$) vote. (p. 265)
- Q) What vote is required to suspend a Bylaw rule?
- A) Bylaws rules cannot be suspended. (p. 263)

Parliamentary Inquiry Incidental

- Q) What classification of motions does Parliamentary Inquiry belong to?
- A) Incidental Motions (p. 69-72)
- Q) What other motions does Parliamentary Inquiry take precedence over?
- A) “All take precedence over any motion with whose purpose they are connected, and can also be made at any time when no question is pending. (p. 292, l. 28-30)

Raise a Question of Privilege Privileged

- Q) What are the two types of Questions of Privilege?
- A) Those relating to the privileges of the assembly as a whole
Questions of personal privilege
- Q) Which type has the highest precedence?
- A) Those relating to the privileges of the assembly. “If the two come into competition, the former take precedence over the later.” (p. 227, l. 15-16)

Chair

Q) Other than the Regular Methods of Voting - Voice, Rising, or Show of Hands, RONR lists six (6) other methods can be ordered by the assembly or prescribed in its rules. Can you name the six other methods of voting? (p. 412-428)

A) Voting by Ballot
Machine or Electronic Voting
Roll Call Vote
Absentee Voting
Vote by Mail
Proxy Voting
